FINANCIAL AID CORNER



Attention class of 2025! The 2025-26 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) will open on December 1, 2024. You need to complete the FAFSA form to apply for student aid such as federal grants, work-study funds, and loans. Completing and submitting the FAFSA form is completely free!

Get a head start on the financial aid process by:

- <u>Creating an FSA ID.</u> All contributors (parents) on your FAFSA will need an FSA ID.
- Collecting 2023 income, tax and asset documentation for all contributors and students.
- Researching financial aid deadlines for all prospective institutions.

COLLEGE ENTRANCE EXAMS



Get paid to study for the ACT and PSAT with impact!

Why should I test? It is recommended that students take at least two entrance exams before submitting college applications. Scoring well on entrance exams can increase a student's eligibility for merit-based aid and special scholarships. Although many institutions across the nation no longer require entrance exams, we encourage students to take at least two exams before graduating. Plus, colleges/universities may require a test score for specific academic majors and scholarships.

How can I prepare? College Now's impact! program provides students with ACT or PSAT test preparation and guides students through college and career research. Our Fall 2024 impact! test sessions are in-person at multiple sites throughout Northeast Ohio and regular attendance is required to successfully complete the program. Note: Students may register for any available location, regardless of their home high school.

But that's not all - students who complete an impact! session receive a stipend!

STUDENT CHECKLIST

What should you do now to support your future?

Stay on track for the school year by checking off the items in your grade's checklist!

Freshmen

- Meet with your <u>College Now advisor</u>.
- Get set up on your school's college & career planning tool (Naviance, SchoolLinks, PATHWAYs, etc.) if available. Log in and complete one task.
- Meet with your guidance counselor. Confirm that your course schedule will set you on the right track. See what additional courses your school offers.
- Get involved! Join a club or team sport, volunteer or work part-time.
- Register to take the <u>PSAT</u>. The first test date this year is October 8.

Sophomores

- Meet your <u>College Now advisor</u> and guidance counselor to confirm that your courses will put you on the right track this year.
- Athletes: If you plan to play sport in college, meet with your coaches to make sure you are on track. Ask your guidance counselor about taking NCAA-approved courses.
- Set up or log into your college & career planning tool (Naviance, SchoolLinks, PATHWAYs, etc.) and familiarize your self with the college admissions process.
- Create or continue to build your resume (a record of your accomplishments, awards, activities, work experience, etc.).
- Join extracurricular activities and volunteer in your community. If you
 haven't participated in activities outside of class, now is the time to sign
 up! Consider school clubs, sports, a part-time job or other activities.
- Ask about test dates for the PSAT and Pre-ACT. Plan to take either test in October. Khan Academy offers free resources to help you prepare.

Juniors

- Meet with your guidance counselor to make sure you are on track to graduate.
- Sign up for College Credit Plus.
- Set a system (e.g. notebook, excel sheet) to track your plans. Ask your College Now advisor for assistance.
- Plan to take the PSAT in October and the SAT/ACT in the spring. Review information about the PSAT/NMSQT with your counselor. Keep your eye out for information about how College Now can help your prepare for these tests.

- Log in to your college & career planning tool (Naviance, SchoolLinks, PATHWAYs, etc.) and review your checklist for junior year, including updating your career interest profile.
- Explore college and career options through your college & career planning tool. Check college visit information through your school to learn when college admissions representatives will be visiting.
- Continue participating in extracurricular activities or join one if you haven't already. Consider school clubs, sports, part-time jobs, etc.
- Keep track of your accomplishments, activities and work experience.
 These will be important pieces of your college applications.

Seniors

- Meet with your <u>College Now advisor</u> to discuss the college application process.
- Update your resume for your college applications.
- Make sure your course schedule is rigorous, challenging and includes all necessary courses for graduation.
- Confirm you are on track to meet all graduation requirements.
- Register for the <u>ACT</u> and/or <u>SAT</u> if you are interested in retesting or taking the other exam. Prepare by <u>registering for a test prep session</u> with College Now.
- Athletes: If interested in playing sports at the collegiate level, complete the NCAA requirements.
- Ask one or two teachers, counselors or administrators (depending on institution requirements) for letters of recommendation. Ask your references what information they need from you and follow up with an email to them with your resume attached. Please allow 2-4 weeks for them to prepare a thorough recommendation.
- Complete and fine-tune your prospective college list. Ensure your list includes the three categories: safety, match and reach. Enter your list in your school's college & career planning tool, as directed by your counselor, so that you can ensure that your transcripts and letters of recommendation are sent in a timely manner.
- Create your <u>FSA ID.</u>
- Record and save the information in a secure location.
- Meet with college representatives and attend college fairs.
- Research the required essays for each college, work on drafting the essays and compile a list of application deadlines.
- Schedule interviews at selected colleges, if applicable.

FAMILY CHECKLIST

What should you be doing with your student to support your future?

It's never too early to have conversations with your student about their

interests and future. At the beginning of the year, take some time to review your student's hobbies and ask them about careers they're interested in for the future.

Middle School

 Check in with your student to see how they are doing, as middle school may include more homework, different types of classes and new friend groups.

All High School Grades

- Continue to discuss your student's interests and encourage them to sign up for sports, clubs and other extracurricular activities.
- Attend workshops on college and career opportunities offered at your student's school.
- Attend college fairs and any exposure opportunities that may be offered.
- Help your student create a professional email address they can use throughout high school. This email should be used on applications for both colleges and jobs. Remind your student to get in the habit of checking their email regularly.

Juniors

- Support your student in taking the ACT or SAT by helping them plan a test
 date that works with their schedule. Make sure to reach out to your
 student's <u>College Now advisor</u> or contact College Now to enroll in test
 preparation sessions or get support for fee waivers if eligible.
- Confirm your student has set up a College Board account on College Board's <u>website</u>. Once they have an account, you should be notified of important testing information as well as other webinars about college admissions.

Seniors

- Ensure that your student works with their College Now Advisor or school counselor to gather letters of recommendation.
- Help your student apply for college, trade school and/or military schools.
 Review the <u>Common Application</u> for colleges and work with your student to make a calendar of application deadlines.
- Think about what you can afford to pay for college or trade school. A <u>Net</u>
 <u>Price Calculator</u> can help you understand the costs of college.
